She is eminently qualified for this work but, just as importantly, she is willing to work her way through piles of paper, to catalog and organize these scientific resources into a database, to make them retrievable to researchers. Sally says that she particularly likes this work because it offers her the flexibility to work when she wants and for as long she likes.



Sally came to Baldwin County because she was tired of fighting the traffic in the Washington, D.C. area. While visiting friends in Fairhope over the years, she became attracted to this area, and chose to settle here when she had the chance. She was born in upper New York State and was raised in central Pennsylvania. She has a B.A. from Bucknell University and a Master of Science in Education from the University of Pennsylvania. Sally did additional graduate work at the Virginia Biological Station and the Rocky Mountain Biological Station.

Sally has over 35 years of experience in the biological sciences. During that time, she taught biology and Advanced Placed Biology to high school students. In addition, she taught A. P. Biology workshops for teachers. Sally also worked in the Smithsonian Natural History Museum in the Mammal Division for two years, and in their Resident Associate Program, providing programs for elementary students who live in the D. ## 2009 BirdFest

Registration for the 6th Annual John L. Borom Alabama Coastal BirdFest is now open, organizers said. "We're ready to accept reservations for our 19 guided tours and two evening events," said **John Borom**, chairman of the festival.

The four-day, eco-tourism event takes place October 15-18, 2009.



An addition this year to BirdFest is a donation drive with a drawing that should appeal to locals and visitors alike, explained **Fran Morley**, BirdFest nestkeeper. "Corporate donations are down this year, so to help support BirdFest and Weeks Bay Foundation, we are seeking donations. For a little extra incentive, we are going to draw names for three wonderful vacations. ## Marsh Bird Survey

As many readers may recall, there has been ongoing research looking at the secretive behavior of marsh birds in the Weeks Bay area. This is part of the biological monitoring initiative of the National Estuarine Research Reserve System where many reserves around the nation have conducted similar research following the same protocols and sampling methods. This work has continued in 2009 with a project funded by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in coordination with the University of Arizona. Researcher **Sybil Glenos** has spent much of the summer rising before day-break to be at her sampling stations at first light. Her training is from Auburn University where she earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Marine

Biology. Ms. Glenos describes her work as very interesting because you never know what you will see or hear when you broadcast bird calls in the early morning hours.

Ms. Glenos coordinates her methodology with **Dr. Courtney Conway** of the University of Arizona. The current study includes field work at Weeks Bay Reserve and also at the Grand Bay Reserve, located just across the Mississippi state line. The survey is looking at specific species of secretive marsh birds of conservational concern at reserves nationwide.

Ms. Glenos' study is looking at 16 species of interest and trying to answer three questions: 1) What is the vocal peak of the secretive species of interest; 2) How do tides affect the vocal peaks; and 3) How do birds from different parts of the country vary in their dialects and response to the broadcasting calls of the researcher. Sybil Glenos continued her summer work through August and has made contact with many interesting birds living in the lush emergent marshes of Weeks Bay.

# Watershed Project

The Weeks Bay Watershed Project celebrates 15 years of constant effort to improve water quality in the Fish and Magnolia Rivers. It began in 1994 when **Patti Hurley** of the Alabama Department of Environmental Management and **Larry Morris** of the Natural Resource Conservation Service started talking of funds available for addressing problems in the watershed. Today **Mike Shelton**, Watershed Coordinator, and the **Citizens Advisory Committee** continue to make great strides at addressing water-quality issues, identifying strategies for resolution and bringing together partners to implement best management practices in the watershed.

When the first of several grants was secured, the lead committee was made up mostly of agency representatives. A second committee was formed for technical assistance, while a third, citizen-based committee was formed to represent the diverse stakeholders in the community. Over the years, this Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) has continued to be the sounding board for water-quality issues. Many members of the CAC are familiar faces of the watershed efforts including **Carey Bentley**, **Bob Miller**, **Randy Roach** and **Everette Weeks**. Others have since joined the CAC efforts, making up the diverse group that today continues to address water-quality problems with on-the-ground solutions. **Bill Penry** has for many years taken a lead role with the CAC in his capacity as chairman of the Baldwin County Soil and Water Conservation District (District). It is with much appreciation that the Watershed Project continues to benefit from the District.

It had been recognized from the inception of the Watershed Project that good leadership was critical to accomplishing the goals set forth in the

grant. The first Watershed Coordinator, **Tina Lynn**, was hired and based at the Reserve from 1995-97. She organized volunteer water-quality monitors in coordination with **Bill Deusch** of Auburn University and the Alabama Water Watch. When Tina moved to New Jersey, **Eve Brantley** took the lead as Watershed Coordinator from 1998-2001. She made great strides in pulling together all the stakeholders to rally around the common goal of ensuring that the rivers run clean. As monitoring continued, an emphasis on identifying the sources of water-quality problems in the watershed increased. When Eve left, **Richard Coram**, volunteer extraordinaire, became acting coordinator. In 2002, Mike Shelton took on the challenge of coordinating watershed efforts. During his early tenure, the state identified 303 (d) listed streams and impaired waterways in the Weeks Bay watershed. Monitoring was refined, cutting edge techniques were explored and source tracking began.

The Weeks Bay Watershed Project has experienced staff changes, retirements, floods, rapid development, budget constraints and a storm of other challenges. What endures is the commitment to keep our waterways clean and address problems on the land that cause water-quality impairments. The realization comes to many that what is bountiful for our common use comes with a commitment of good stewardship. The Weeks Bay Watershed Project continues to be effective through good leadership, partnerships and the commitment that no challenge is too great to be addressed. Celebrate 15 years of this watershed effort with your own personal commitment to contribute where you can to improve water quality in the Weeks Bay watershed.

## Coastal Training Program

The Coastal Training Program (CTP) at the Reserve conducted several training events for coastal decision-makers. Training events included one on wetland regulation and compliance issues targeting a realtor and legal audience and a wildland/urban interface workshop. The wetland regulation workshop was conducted with help from the Alabama Coastal Foundation, the Mobile Area and Baldwin County Associations of Realtors and Hand Arendall, LLC. CTP Coordinator, **Mike Shelton** worked with the South Alabama Regional Planning Commission, the Forestry Commission and the Cooperative Extension Service to help the audience better understand the challenges and concerns arising in the interfaces between the rural and urban environments.

The upcoming months will be filled with additional training events. Grand Bay and Weeks Bay Reserves will host a wetland restoration workshop featuring wetland expert **Dr. Andy Clewell**. Dr. Clewell has worked on projects along the Pascagoula and Pearl Rivers in Mississippi, projects on reclaimed coal mines in Kentucky and projects in phosphate-mined areas in Florida, to name only a few. Also, submerged aquatic vegetation restoration will be the topic of a workshop done in coordination with ADCNR Coastal Section, Barry Vittor & Associates, the Department of Environmental Management and the Dauphin Island Sea Lab. ### Water Quality Protection in Theaters

The Reserve, the Foundation, Dauphin Island Sea Lab and the Gulf of Mexico Alliance are using a different approach to get the environmental message to local citizens. Over a six-month period, an animated spot will be shown before each movie - about 19,000 times - at the Rave Motion Pictures theater in Daphne, Alabama. The message delivers information about the damage caused by polluted stormwater runoff and directs viewers to a website, [www.gulfallianceeducation.org](http://www.gulfallianceeducation.org).

## Graduate Research

**John Eric Ezell**, Starkville, Mississippi, is a recent recipient of the Graduate Research Fellowship program. He is working on his Master of Science degree from Mississippi State University. His study will take a look at two little known areas, the biogeochemistry of the sediment in the bay and the distribution of very low oxygen concentrations (hypoxia) in the water column.

For the proposed hypoxia research, ten sediment cores will be taken from selected sampling locations in Weeks Bay. Microelectrode profiles will be conducted on these cores to measure oxygen (O<sub>2</sub>)

and sulfide (H<sub>2</sub>S) concentrations as well as measurements that reveal the potential for bottom sediments to consume oxygen. This data will provide an understanding of the geochemistry of the sediment in Weeks Bay during hypoxic events and normal oxygen conditions and will provide a measure of the differences among the sampling locations.

Water column measurements including dissolved oxygen, pH, temperature, salinity and specific conductivity will be recorded at the selected locations on a day/night cycle primarily in the summer months but also throughout the year when phytoplankton blooms are present. The analyzed data will identify which areas in Weeks Bay are most likely to undergo seasonal hypoxia and will shed light on the interplay between the water column and the bottom sediments. The resulting information may be applied to studies concerning a wide range of topics and should be a good asset to the Reserve staff and future researchers.

## River Cleanup

Number thirteen brought no bad luck for the volunteers taking part in the 13th Annual Weeks Bay Area River Cleanup. Eager volunteers met at the Weeks Bay Resource Center on Saturday, May 9, 2009, to pick up debris by boat, by car or by truck from Weeks Bay, Fish and Magnolia Rivers and their tributaries. Eighty-seven cleanup participants recovered about 4,500 lbs of trash. Many participants were lucky enough to be rewarded with some great door prizes. Everyone who attended River Cleanup left knowing they had done their part to keep the water clean.

The Weeks Bay Reserve, ADCNR Lands Division Coastal Section along with the Weeks Bay Watershed Project and its Citizens Advisory Committee, Baldwin County Soil and Water Conservation District, Baldwin County Commission, **Greer Radcliff**, Fairhope Single Tax Corporation, Bay Animal Clinic North, Weeks Bay Foundation, and NOAA provided support for the 2009 cleanup event. ## EstuaryLive Broadcast

On May 15, Reserve staff teamed up with other Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources employees to broadcast two, one-hour EstuaryLive (ELive) shows. ELive is a virtual fieldtrip, via the internet, that brings est-

uaries from around the country directly to classrooms. On May 1, three other reserves broadcast ELive programs using satellite technology, but Weeks Bay was the first reserve to use the direct to the internet broadcasting method.

The theme for the Weeks Bay Reserve programs was "Threatened and Endangered Species of Coastal Alabama." The programs focused on three coastal habitats and some of the threatened and endangered animal species that live in them. Several experts from the area brought live animals to display and discuss during the programs. All indications are that the Weeks Bay Reserve ELive broadcasts were a great success! Estimates are that between 1,500 and 2,000 students viewed the broadcasts. The "Live" component of the program involved students emailing their questions during the shows. The experts answered as many questions as time allowed during the live broadcasts, but this year over 400 questions were received from students across the U.S., Canada and Mexico. The Weeks Bay Reserve programs received more questions than the other three ELive programs combined! ## Regional Training

The Foundation's Gulf Regional Training program recently hosted several workshops throughout the Gulf Coast. In collaboration with the Apalachicola Reserve Coastal Training Program (CTP), an Innovative Floodplain Strategies workshop was held in Cedar Key, Florida. Attendees learned how conservation planning and protection of marshes, floodplains and other wetlands can protect coastal resources while also helping to reduce storm and flooding impacts.

The Gulf Regional Training program collaborated with the Rookery Bay Reserve CTP in Naples, Florida, to host a Living Shorelines workshop.

Living Shorelines are a habitat-friendly alternative to traditional waterfront property stabilization techniques such as bulkheads and seawalls. Speakers discussed the barriers and benefits of living shorelines while walking attendees through the complicated permitting process in Southwest Florida.

In addition to those in Florida, events were also held in coastal Texas and Mississippi. Two geographic information systems (GIS) training sessions were held at Texas A&M Corpus Christi in partnership with the Mission-Aransas Reserve CTP and the NOAA Coastal Services Center. Both introductory and advanced courses were offered, and gave participants the opportunity to understand the basics of GIS through hands-on computer training. Lastly, a Wetlands and Water Quality workshop was held in early August in each of Mississippi's three coastal counties in partnership with the Grand Bay Reserve CTP.

Planning for the fall's Gulf Regional Training events is well underway. October will be a busy month, with wetland workshops planned for Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama. 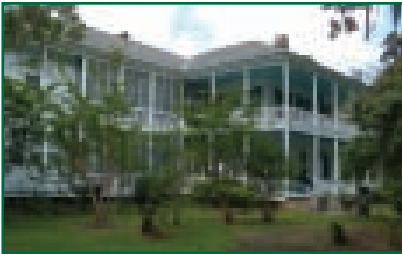

# Swift-Coles Historic Home Tour

In 1902, the home was expanded to 16 rooms. **Nik Coles** purchased it in 1976 and began a lengthy and thorough restoration. Upon Mr. Coles' death, it was bequeathed to the Baldwin County Historic Development Commission which manages the property along with the Baldwin County Department of Archives and History. ## Juniper Preserve Expanded

In August, the Foundation purchased a 3.2 acre parcel that adjoins an 8.5 acre tract purchased last year. This acquisition increased the size of the Juniper Preserve to 29.7 acres of restored pitcher plant bog and wetland habitats. The additional acreage will serve as a wetland buffer and sustain critical habitat for migratory birds and wildlife. Funds from the **Jack Edwards Conservation Fund** - a portion of which was donated by the Alabama Coastal BirdFest - were utilized for this purchase.



The southern white-fringed orchid, *Platanthera conspicua*, flowers in late summer and is one of the showiest native orchids. This beautiful, immaculate white orchid was first discovered by **Dr. Bill Summerour** at the Juniper Preserve in 2006 at which time only 20 plants were found. In response to the Foundation's prescribed burn program the population has now increased to over 400 plants. The Juniper Preserve is the only site along the Alabama Gulf Coast where this rare orchid is known to occur, making the Juniper Preserve and the acquisition of a buffer zone especially important.

The Foundation works to protect this and other ecologically-sensitive lands in coastal Alabama, serving as a land trust for the area, and can accept donations of land and conservation easements. For more information about conservation options, call (251) 990-5004.
